MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS FOR THE THREE MONTHS ENDED AUGUST 31, 2015

The following management's discussion and analysis ("MD&A") and financial review, prepared as at October 23, 2015, should be read in conjunction with the condensed interim financial statements and related notes for the three months ended August 31, 2015 of Mitchell Resources Ltd. ("Mitchell" or the "Company"). The following disclosure and associated financial statements are presented in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS"). Except as otherwise disclosed, all dollar figures included therein and in the following MD&A are quoted in Canadian dollars.

Forward-looking Statements

This MD&A contains certain statements that may constitute "forward-looking statements". Company Overview

The Company currently is a reporting issuer in British Columbia and Alberta. On May 26, 2015 the Company changed its name from Kola Mining Corp. to Mitchell Resources Ltd. The Company's common shares are listed on the TSX Venture Exchange ("TSXV") and trade under the symbol "MI". The Company's principal office is located at #1305 - 1090 West Georgia Street, Vancouver, British Columbia V6E 3V7.

The Company is a junior mineral exploration company which had been engaged in the sourcing, exploration and development of unproven mineral interests in Russia. The Company was in default of the performance criteria called for by the Souker License and, effective March 6, 2015 the Company was advised by governmental authorities that the Souker License had been terminated. Management recorded a write-off of the remaining nominal amount of \$1 in fiscal 2015.

The Company continues with its recapitalization process and still relies on the continued financial support from its management and other shareholders. The Company requires additional financing to meet its ongoing levels of corporate overhead, retire existing liabilities and debt obligations, and acquire other resource properties. As a result of this uncertainty, there is significant doubt as to the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. While the Company has been successful in securing financings in the past, there can be no assurance that it will be able to do so in the future. Accordingly, this report does not give effect to adjustments, if any, which would be necessary should the Company be unable to continue as a going concern and, therefore, be required to realize its assets and liquidate its liabilities in other than the normal course of business and at amounts which may differ from those shown in the financial statements.

Results of Operations

Three Months Ended August 31, 2015 Compared to Three Months Ended May 31, 2015

During the three months ended August 31, 2015 (“Q1/2016”) the Company reported a net loss of \$39,537 compared to a net loss of \$28,192 for the three months ended May 31, 2015 (“Q4/2015”), an increase in loss of \$11,345. The fluctuation arose primarily due to:

- (i) recognition of \$10,710 in Q1/2016 for the audit of fiscal 2015; and
- (ii) during Q4/2015 the Company recognized a gain of \$6,270 on the settlement and retirement of indebtedness.

Three Months Ended August 31, 2015 Compared to Three Months Ended August 31, 2014

During the three months ended August 31, 2015 (the “2015 period”) the Company reported a net loss of \$39,537 (\$0.00 per share) compared to a net loss of \$18,214 (\$0.00 per share) for the three months ended August 31, 2014 (the “2014 period”), an increase in loss of \$21,323. The fluctuation arose primarily due to:

- (i) incurred \$4,200 (2014 - \$3,100) with Chase Management Ltd. (“Chase”) a private corporation owned by Mr. Nick DeMare, the President/CEO of the Company, for accounting and administration services provided by Chase personnel, excluding Mr. DeMare;
- (ii) recognition of \$10,710 (2014 - \$nil) of audit fees in the 2015 period for the audit of fiscal 2015. The audit fee for fiscal 2014 was not rendered to the Company until the second quarter of fiscal 2015;
- (iii) incurred \$3,542 (2014 - \$1,887) for regulatory and transfer agent fees. The increase in 2015 was due to incremental costs associated with the Company’s name change; and
- (iv) commencing November 1, 2014 the Company agreed to pay interest on loans received at the rate of a 6% per annum. Accordingly, the Company recorded \$7,177 interest expenses in the 2015 period.

Cash Flows

During the 2015 and 2014 periods the Company did not complete any financings.

Financial Condition / Capital Resources

As at August 31, 2015 the Company had a working capital deficiency \$51,146, shareholder's deficiency of \$570,916 and non-current liabilities of \$519,770. In the immediate term, the Company's ability to continue as a going concern is dependent upon the continued support of its President, shareholders and other related parties, its ability to acquire mineral property interests and to continue to raise additional capital to fund its ongoing corporate activities and retire its loans. Additional capital may be sought from existing shareholders from the sale of additional common shares or other equity or debt instruments. There is no assurance such additional capital will be available to the Company on acceptable terms or at all. Accordingly, this report does not give effect to adjustments, if any, which would be necessary should the Company be unable to continue as a going concern and, therefore, be required to realize its assets and liquidate its liabilities in other than the normal course of business and at amounts which may differ from those shown in the financial statements.

On October 16, 2015 the President of the Company exercised warrants and the Company issued 314,000 common shares for \$15,700.

Off-Balance Sheet Arrangements

The Company has no off-balance sheet arrangements.

Proposed Transactions

The Company has no proposed transactions.

Critical Accounting Estimates

Critical Judgments and Sources of Estimation Uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Estimates and assumptions are continuously evaluated and are based on management's experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Uncertainty about these judgments, estimates and assumptions could result in outcomes that could require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the assets or liabilities in future years.

Estimation Uncertainty

The information about significant areas of estimation uncertainty considered by management in preparing the financial statements is as follows:

(i) **Income taxes**

The estimation of income taxes includes evaluating the recoverability of deferred tax assets based on an assessment of the Company's ability to utilize the underlying future tax deductions against future taxable income prior to expiry of those deductions. Management assesses whether it is probable that some or all of the deferred income tax assets will not be realized. The ultimate realization of deferred tax assets is dependent upon the generation of future taxable income, which in turn is dependent upon the successful discovery, extraction, development and commercialization of mineral reserves. To the extent that management's assessment of the Company's ability to utilize future tax deductions changes, the Company would be required to recognize more or fewer deferred tax assets, and deferred income tax provisions or recoveries could be affected.

Critical Judgments

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgments regarding the going concern of the Company as well as the determination of functional currency.

A detailed summary of all the Company's significant accounting policies is included in Note 3 to the May 31, 2015 audited annual financial statements.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There are no changes in accounting policies. For accounting standards adopted during fiscal 2015 and for accounting standards and interpretations issued but not yet effective, refer to Note 3 in the May 31, 2015 audited annual financial statements.

As at August 31, 2015, \$39,950 remained unpaid.

(ii) During the three months ended August 31, 2015 the Company incurred a total of \$4,200 (2014 - \$3,100) to Chase, a private corporation owned by Mr. DeMare, for accounting and administration services provided by Chase personnel, excluding Mr. DeMare. As at August 31, 2015, \$3,500 (2014 - \$3,100) remained unpaid.

(c) The Company has received ongoing loans from DNG Capital Corp. ("DNG") a private company owned by Mr. DeMare. Commencing November 1, 2014 the Company agreed to pay DNG a financing fee of \$20,000 and to pay interest at a rate of 6% per annum on all outstanding principal amounts. During the three months ended August 31, 2015 the Company recognized \$7,177 (2014 - \$nil) of interest expense.

Financial Instruments and Risk Management

The Company's financial instruments recorded at fair value require disclosure about how the fair value was determined based on significant levels of inputs described in the following hierarchy:

Level 1 - Quoted prices are available in active markets for identical assets or liabilities as of the reporting date. Active markets are those in which transactions occur in sufficient frequency and value to provide pricing information on an ongoing basis.

Level 2 - Pricing inputs are other than quoted prices in active markets included in Level 1. Prices in Level 2 are either directly or indirectly observable as of the reporting date. Level 2 valuations are based on inputs including quoted forward prices for commodities, time value and volatility factors, which can be substantially observed or corroborated in the market place.

Level 3 - Valuations in this level are those with inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data.

The recorded amounts for GST receivable, accounts payable and accrued liabilities and loans approximate their fair value. The Company's cash under the fair value hierarchy is measured using Level 1 inputs.

The Company's risk exposures and the impact on the Company's financial instruments are summarized below:

Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk of loss associated with a counterparty's inability to fulfill its payment obligations. The Company's credit risk is primarily attributable to cash and GST receivable. Management believes that the credit risk concentration with respect to cash and GST receivable is remote as cash is held with a high quality financial institution and GST receivable represents amounts due from the Government of Canada.

Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will not have the resources to meet its obligations as they fall due. The Company manages this risk by closely monitoring cash forecasts and managing resources to ensure that it will have sufficient liquidity to meet its obligations. The Company has financial liabilities classified as current that are due within the next fiscal period. The Company will need to obtain additional financing to meet the obligations as they come due.

Market Risk

Market risk is the risk of loss that may arise from changes in market factors such as interest rates, foreign exchange rates, and commodity and equity prices. These fluctuations may be significant.

(a) Interest Rate Risk

The Company is exposed to interest rate risk to the extent that the cash bears floating rates of interest. The interest rate risk on cash is not considered significant. The Company has interest bearing debt at fixed rates and is therefore not subject to fluctuating interest rate risk on its non-current loans payable

(b) Foreign Currency Risk

The Company's functional currency is the Canadian dollar and major transactions are transacted in Canadian Dollars and US Dollars. The Company maintains minimal cash deposits in US Dollars with its Canadian bank. As such, the fluctuation of the Canadian Dollar in relation to the US Dollar will have an

impact upon the profitability of the Company and may also affect the value of the Company's assets and the amount of shareholders' deficiency. However, as the Company does not maintain significant cash balances in US Dollars and settles any transactions in US Dollars quickly, its exposure to currency risk is considered insignificant as at August 31, 2015.

Risks and Uncertainties

An investment in the Company's common shares is highly speculative and subject to a number of risks and uncertainties. Only those persons who can bear the risk of the entire loss of their investment should consider investing in the Company's common shares.

The Company competes with other mining companies, some of which have greater financial resources and technical facilities, for the acquisition of mineral concessions, claims and other interests, as well as for the recruitment and retention of qualified employees.

Outstanding Share Data

The Company's authorized share capital is unlimited common shares with no par value. As at October 23, 2015, there were 21,045,998 issued and outstanding common shares and 2,567,400 warrants outstanding at exercise prices ranging from \$0.05 to \$0.20 per share.
